Lotus birth (or umbilical cord nonseverance - UCNS) is the practice of leaving the umbilical cord uncut after childbirth so that the baby is left attached to the placenta until the cord naturally separates at the umbilicus. This usually occurs within 3\u0010 days after birth.

Lotus birth is the practice of leaving the umbilical cord uncut until separation occurs naturally. The baby, cord, and placenta are viewed as one unit. A short-Term lotus birth is leaving the umbilical cord attached to the placenta and baby for 4-48 hours before it's severed. A long-term lotus birth, also known as a full lotus birth, allows the cord to naturally fall off from the belly button on its own time (usually within 3-10 days).
